

1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 6:10 p.m.

2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

3. ROLL CALL

Present: Councilmembers Lediju (arrived at 6:33 p.m.), Palmares, and Matias.

Staff present: Deputy Police Chief Bob Knight, Captain Sanjay Ramrakha, Captain Jerome Bautista, Lieutenant Jeremy Huff, Sergeant Rashad Hollis, Assistant City Manager Nalungo Conley, City Attorney Veronica Nebb, and Tony Chu, Transportation Program Superintendent/Traffic Engineer.

Community Partners Present: Reina Sandoval-Beverly, Regional Director Family Justice Alliance; Nora Martinez, Lead Navigator, Family Justice Center Solano; Elsa Flores, Kaiser Permanente; LaShara Johnson, Site & Client Services Director West County Family Justice Center; Bart Ney, Caltrans Chief of Public Affairs; Tanya Brownrigg, Victim Empowerment Support Team (VEST); California Highway Patrol Captain, Josh Tiffiee.

4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

5. UPDATE ON PUBLIC SAFETY ITEMS

A UPDATE ON THE FOLLOWING PUBLIC SAFETY ITEMS

- Operations Report, Staffing and Crime Data
- Domestic Crime Violence

Police Operations Report Including Recruitment & Hiring: Deputy Chief Knight reported that Vallejo Police Department pursuits have decreased. Traffic stops and arrests increased 42%. Highlights that use of force (UOF) has decreased, a good trend as arrests have increased. Assaults on officers increased 23%.

Captain Bautista noted the department will focus on two new reports, one of which breaks down crimes per city beat. The second focus will be to add additional information to the operations report but still using the same format.

Signage will be available once discussions with Public Works are complete. The signs will specifically read No Sex Zone.

Sergeant Hollis mentioned the Business Watch community expressed appreciation for a stronger presence and faster response times.

Council Member Matias asked about abandoned vehicles. Deputy Chief Knight noted there are two types, an evidence tow, and a rotational tow.

Council Member Lediju requested an “aging report” related to the numbers and age of the impounded-evidence tows. She asked that this information be sent to the Solano District Attorney’s office while we are negotiating the tow contracts.

6. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE REVIEW

A CONTINUANCE OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE & CASE REVIEW

Deputy Chief Knight started the Domestic Violence (DV) discussion and reported that the DV Initiative proposal is written and under review. The new updated resource pamphlet is in the works. He reported that the second training related to lethality assessment is complete. All Patrol, Dispatchers, and IHart staff have been instructed in DV lethality awareness recognition training. Multiple victims have already had referrals. IHart and Family Justice Alliance are working together. A QR (Quick Response) code on the resource card is coming soon, which will help with public outreach. The Vallejo Police Department aims to initiate the “Train the Trainer” process for lethality assessment protocols.

PARTNERSHIP GUEST COMMENTS:

Rayvon Williamson introduced himself.

Family Justice Alliance discussed recent training.

Sharon from the South Bay Coalition and Human Trafficking mentioned the community reporting program Reportjohn.gov is on a Vallejo Billboard. She mentioned that during the Superbowl there were 39 operations with 73 adult survivors identified, 10 children, and 36 sex buyers arrested.

7. Traffic Safety Update

California Highway Patrol (CHP) Captain Josh Tiffée, Bart Ney from Caltrans, and City of Vallejo Traffic Engineer Tony Chu discuss the upcoming Highway 29-Sonoma Boulevard project.

Bart Ney reported on the repaving of six miles of Sonoma Boulevard and Highway 29 with a cost of thirty-one million dollars. The cost includes lane

reductions, road diets, bulb-outs (curbs extend farther), left-turn pockets, landscaping, a class 4 bike lane, and all-new traffic signals and lighting.

Lieutenant Huff stated that the Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) grant has been applied for.

ACTION ITEMS:

Council Member Palmares requests prioritizing the following items:

- Lighting
- Illuminate crosswalks
- Increase coordination between agencies
- Pedestrian Lane Timers (PLT) on Sonoma Boulevard

Council Member Matias requested more radar speed signs.

Council Member Lediju requested a list of hot spots, times, dates, and cases dating back to past years to review data on traffic accidents and speed issues.

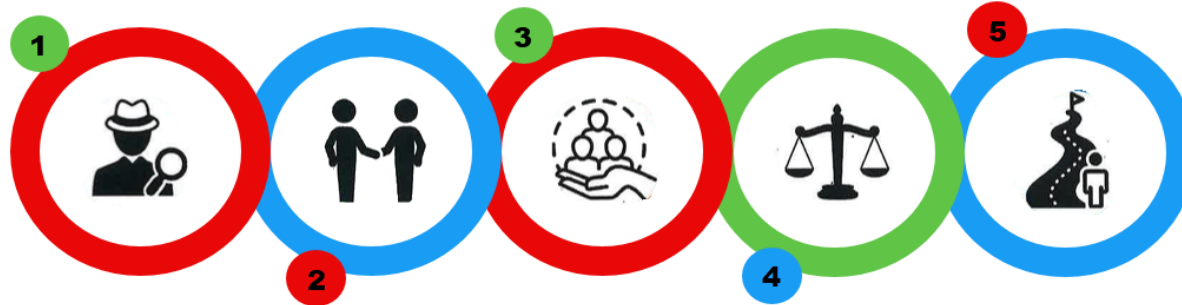
