## **RE: 2021-22 Proposed State Budget – Support for California’s Independent Live Venues**

Dear Senate Pro Tem Atkins, Speaker Rendon, Budget Chairs Skinner and Ting, and Budget Subcommittee Chairs Caballero and Carrillo,

We write to raise your awareness about independent live music venues throughout the State of California and urge your consideration of including a targeted appropriation in the State Budget specifically for these venues. These independent venues are not only the foundation of our local creative economies, employing thousands of Californians; they also serve as catalysts for socio-economic inclusion and powerful platforms for emerging and independent artists. However, their future remains uncertain without additional support.

These venues were the first to close and will be the last to reopen. The impact on these venues is staggering with most seeing at least 95% revenue loss and 95% of their employees furloughed. However, these venues retain 100% of their overhead expenses such as payroll, mortgages, and insurance. According to a survey in June of over 3,000 independent venue owners, promoters and bookers across the country conducted by the National Independent Venue Association (NIVA), 90% of venues are at risk of bankruptcy.

The impact on California’s economy would be broad and far-reaching should venues throughout the state be forced to close their doors for good. The 2020 Otis Report on the Creative economy states that 15.4% of all jobs (2.7 million) in California are in the creative industries, generating \$650.3 billion in total annual output per year. Further, the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that in 2017, the arts and culture sector contributed \$230.3 billion to California’s economy, representing 8.2% of the state’s GDP—a larger share of the state’s economy than Construction (\$102 billion), or Transportation (\$72 billion). Studies have found that for every

dollar spent on a ticket for a show at an independent music venue, twelve additional dollars are spent nearby at restaurants, bars, lodging and transportation.

A portion of the federal COVID-19 relief bill approved in late December aimed to ensure access to local entertainment in all 50 states. The provisions of the "Save Our Stages Act" became the Shuttered Venue Operator grant, which established a \$15 billion grant program for live venue operators, promoters, producers and talent representatives across the United States. While this is a significant development, the unfortunate reality is that this act will not reach enough of our California venues to prevent further shuttering of some of the State's most iconic independently owned venues.

Several other states have taken action to prevent venues from closing their doors. On January 15 for example, Governor Larry Hogan of Maryland, announced \$30 million for more than 90 live music and performance venues, live entertainment promoters, and independently-owned local movie theaters whose operations have been impacted by COVID-19. Oregon and Illinois have allocated \$50 million and \$60 million respectively, towards their state's creative economy ecosystem. Other states such as Colorado have also proposed \$25 million with Wisconsin and Delaware also taking action.

We strongly encourage you to consider appropriating resources for these venues that have experienced extreme revenue loss, to ensure their doors remain open. We look forward to working with you to develop a much-needed lifeline for these venues and to save our California stages.

The City of Vallejo's Commission on Culture and the Arts respectfully requests your support for the North Bay Venue Coalition's (NBVC) urgent request for county and state assistance for independent music venues and promoters across the North Bay. Independent venues, whose members, employees, and local artist communities face an existential crisis as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, are in urgent need of targeted legislative and regulatory assistance.

Live venues were the first to close as a result of the pandemic and, sadly, will be the last to reopen. These businesses and artists have been disproportionately affected by the pandemic. Many may close forever without meaningful intervention from state and local government. Many venues across California and the country have already permanently closed. The remaining venues are in dire need, having already been shuttered and without revenue for 11 months.

It will likely take another eight to nine months for venues to resume their full performance schedules, requiring months of pre-planning, booking, and rehiring. However, this cannot effectively begin until state and local authorities establish reopening guidelines specific to performance venues.

Recent NIVA (National Independent Venue Association) statistics on the impact of the pandemic show staggering losses the organizations almost 3,000 members:

- 95% Revenue Loss
- 95% Employees Furloughed
- 100% Ongoing Overhead Expense Liability
- 90% Venues at risk of bankruptcy

The collapse of this culturally important industry has devastated the music and performing arts ecosystem and deeply affected our local economies. These venues directly support industry professionals. Their economic reach will be paramount to post



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covid economic recovery. It is estimated that every \$1 spent on tickets generates \$12 of economic activity at nearby bars, restaurants, studios, cafes, hotels, transportation services and retail.

Independent venues are asking for an investment to secure their future. If these venues close forever, the North Bay will not only lose our cultural and entertainment hubs, we will also lose the engine that would otherwise be a driver of economic revival for the surrounding businesses.

We request your support for NBVC. We respectfully urge the passage of state and local legislation to assist these important businesses by granting access to emergency funding. Please help Save Our Stages.
